## In the Classroom

Under the instruction of Sarah Heilers, the Fort Loramie Agricultural Education classes are busy learning about many facets of agriculture.

#### **Senior Capstone**

Each capstone project it making great success. As greenhouse manager, Pam Meyer is busy taking inventory and ordering plugs, pots, flats, and seeds for the spring plant sale. Plants will be arriving the beginning of March. Ashley Holthaus is focusing on composting for her capstone. She built composting bins from 24 inch field tile and has collected food waste from the cafeteria. She is well on her way!

#### Animal & Plant Bioscience

Agriculturalists continually have a main focus on the importance of animal well-being. Students in the Animal and Plant Bioscience class are learning basic animal care that can be applied to any species. They are learning proper methods of administering medications, record keeping, and how to provided adequate housing throughout the year. Students are also studying the importance of bio-security and animal welfare.

#### **Busy with Committee Work**

**Plant & Horticulture Science** Finding their "Green Thumb,"

students in the Plant and Horticulture Science class are designing their own germination experiments with corn and soybeans to test germination rate variables. Each student can determine the variables they want to test, such as the effects of temperature, moisture, light exposure, seed depth, and others. Students will then chart germination rates to determine optimal conditions.

Each class has been divided into committees to allow everyone a part in planning FFA activities. Committees meet once or twice a week during class to plan for their activities. With FFA week quickly approaching, many committees have been very busy planning their part of the week. The Citizenship Committee is planning a "Building Partnership Breakfast" by inviting area businesspersons to an open house breakfast to create new partnerships and thank them for their support. The Ag Awareness Committee is organizing the annual Ag Olympics to be held Thursday afternoon for the Jr. High and High School students. The Healthy Lifestyles Committee is conducting a Farm Safety event at the elementary school to teach the 6th graders the importance of using safe practices on the farm.
